

## Fortnum & Mason (Opening October 2018)

London's iconic food store, Fortnum & Mason will be opening in two spots at The Royal Exchange in the City - with a food hall and a restaurant and bar space The food hall will stock a range of its most popular teas, preserves and hampers alongside features such as a confectionery counter and a fresh produce offer. The retailer will also offer a dining and bar area with up to 90 covers.

# Lahpet (Just Opened)

Relocating from their London Fields pop-up to a 76 seater restaurant where Brick Lane meets Shoreditch, Burmese run Lahpet is bringing otherwise underrated cuisine from Myanmar to the East London crowd. Head chef Zaw Mahesh has previously worked at places such as Daylesford Organic, which is no doubt influencing the menu. Seasonal British ingredients are used when they're available, but are supported by monthly imports from his home country. Lahpet means 'tea' in Burmese, a reference to their signature pickled tea leaf salad, a staple ingredient that also makes its way onto the cocktail menu.

# Mrs. Fogg's (Opening September 2018)

One of a series of bars based on the Victorian globe trotter Mr. Fogg from Around the World in Eighty Days, this latest venue is named after the fictional explorer's wife. With an innovative use of botanicals and other ingredients following the spirit of the Jules Vernes novel, Mrs Fogg's will bring an unusual 19th Century drinking experience to the City in Broadgate Circle. Existing incarnations feature eclectic interiors and a tipsy tea service, so expect a fantastical twist on after-work drinks.



# St Leonard's (Just opened)

Inspired by a 'very boozy lunch' at his mother's Sussex home, Jackson Boxer and partner Andrew Clarke have just opened a 'primal, simple and honest' restaurant in Shoreditch, with Anglo-French cooking using seasonal ingredients. The space has been designed to facilitate the fresh menu, with an ice bar for raw fish and open hearth cooking for meat and vegetables – some sourced directly from Boxer's family farm. St. Leonard's aims to bring the atmosphere of alfresco summertime dining to the city, so be sure to pair the food with a strong drink from the cognac-focused cocktail list.





Leroy is a buzzy bistro-style restaurant offering casual Parisian dining in a less formal setting than its Michelin-starred predecessor Ellory. It offers a selection of smaller plates paired with an excellent wine list from sommelier owners Ed Thaw and Jack Lewens, in a small space just off Great Eastern Street. Billed as 'thoughtful but not showy,' Leroy also has a reasonable set lunch menu during the week for the work crowd, and is just as suitable for a leisurely dinner as it is for sampling their own house vermouth with a snack.



Brat (Just Opened)

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Brat is the first solo venture from Tomos Parry, previously at award-winning Kitty Fisher's. Named after the colloquial term for turbot, the menu blends Parry's Welsh roots with Basque cuisine, featuring meticulously sourced fish and beef. Found on well-known Redchurch Street in Shoreditch, the first floor dining room retains its original 1930s features and is flooded with natural light, making Brat attractive for both lunch and dinner. Expect seasonal ingredients and a solid wine & sherry list.

# B&B Italia's unique approach to contemporary design

With the rich industrial heritage of Hackney on one side and the traditions and energy of the City on the other to inspire, the interior design at One Crown Place was always going to be an exciting prospect.

Bowler James Brindley, the studio charged with creating a scheme, have struck the right notes designing something unique, luxurious and unexpected. The key: to embrace both the geometric forms and contemporary nature of the new residential buildings designed by architects KPF, as well as respecting the retained Georgian townhouse frontage, which will house a hotel. Thanks to a partnership with Italian manufacturers B&B Italia and Arclinea, as partof the overall design, each of the 246 one, two and three bedroom apartments, as well as the penthouses, will have bespoke kitchens and wardrobes.

The collaboration between KPF, BJB and B&B Italia, which owns the kitchen specialists Arclinea, has proved a particularly fruitful one. Lucy Southall, a partner at Bowler James Brindley explains, "Our overall vision for the project was in response to the architecture, a wonderful fusion of old and new. Working "When it comes to fitting 246 apartments one needs factory precision," Southall closely with the architects is important to us, to ensure there's a holistic vision that connects the building and interior. We then tried to harness that feeling in the kitchens and wardrobes."

The result is both elegant and modern, with a hint of an industrial New York loft style. Southall explains further. "For the materialisation we looked to the City and Hackney as an influence. We wanted to celebrate the kitchen by adding materials such as stainless steel and reeded glass for the display units, while the dark grey, matte finish of the unit doors represents the sophistication of the City. We also decided to mix metals: stainless steel and brass to create a more eclectic feel.'

Having presented a marketing suite, complete with a joinery-built custom kitchen, BJB understood that while the design worked, it needed the expertise of specialists to refine the functions. This presented an ideal opportunity to work with B&B Italia and Arclinea.

explains. "B&B Italia is one of the most respected industrial producers in the world - as is Arclinea for kitchens. To utilise their knowledge of mechanisms,

Heather Naylor, the general manager for B&B Italia in the UK, brought in at the start of 2017 to give life to BJB's designs for the kitchens and wardrobes, has been closely involved. "Our job was to stay absolutely true to the BJB design, to look at their dream and then engineer it," she says.

"We had a great trip over to the Arclinea factory in Vincenzo to talk about how to facilitate our design," Southall recalls. "We talked a lot about detailing and making the most of the internals of the kitchen, how to ensure quality and consistency. They also introduced us to some materials we didn't know." Kitchen doors in the marketing suite were originally a painted lacquer, but are now a highly durable material called Fenix, which is heat and scratch resistant, but still resembles the luxurious grey, matte surface BJB had originally selected. The work surfaces of the challenging triangular islands are, thanks to Arclinea, now a stone composite called Silestone, which mimics natural stone, but is uniform in finish and durable.

The magic in the kitchen really happens when you open doors and drawers. "We've used our own standard carcasses, standard mechanisms and standard hinges, standard drawer runners, but have made custom drawer and door

and wardrobes were very much our vision, but work because of their expertise." smoothly. Where there was opportunity to add more efficient storage and refine the layouts, Arclinea was able to advise.

> The wardrobes in each bedroom are unique in appearance and function too. "We took inspiration from the Georgian terraces, so wanted the wardrobes to have the essence of freestanding furniture of that era, which is why they have little brass feet and a bit of space around them" says Southall. To add warmth, BJB selected a dark oak timber finish, but with advice from B&B Italia it became a highly sophisticated, raised-grain laminate, which looks and feels like the original design. "We came up with lots of ideas for the internal carcass too," Naylor adds. "We found a material that looks like a fabric. It's embossed into the finish so it gives it much more depth, softness and texture." Lighting too has been thought through, with B&B Italia creating a built-in system within each wardrobe. In addition, B&B Italia will offer residents the opportunity to purchase an pick-list of extras, such as additional drawers, shoe-racks and pull-out rails, while kitchens will have extra inserts, plate racks and other types of storage. Everything will be made in Italy.

Naylor has the last word. "The thing about this project is it was all about the layers working together - a really constructive and collaborative way of working. We're all so proud of the result."







# The Culpeper

For a cool (as a cucumber) experience, head along to the Culpeper pub where the rooftop has been transformed into a pickle-centric experience inspired by the herbalist and botanist Nichols Culpeper. The cucumber season is May to September, and whilst the resident 8ft gherkin will be a constant, the cucumbers around him will begin to flourish, and as the summer evolves, so will the number and scale of cucumbers! The theme of the rooftop will be drawn directly from the natural beauty of the pickle, from the striped decking, lighting and soft furnishings to the cocktail and food menu (booking recommended).



### The Aviary

Perched high above the capital with enviable views out over the City, London's hottest new destination rooftop restaurant, bar and grand terrace, Aviary, has come home to roost. The Aviary nests on the 10th floor of the Montcalm Royal London House Hotel, one of the capital's most original five star hotels in one of its most dynamic districts.



### Sushi Samba

Located on the 28th and 29th floors of 110 Bishopsgate (formerly the Heron Tower), Sushi Samba boasts the highest outdoor dining terrace in Europe. If you are hungry, enjoy the unique blend of Japanese, Brazilian and Peruvian cuisine or simply enjoy sipping cocktails and soaking up the breathtaking views of London from the dizzy heights of the roof terrace.



### Jin Bo Law

To experience views of the City and the River Thames head down to newly opened Jin Bo Law on top of the Dorsett City Hotel at Aldgate. The cocktail menu is Asian-inspired, including the Dragon Air, their take on a white Negroni - replacing gin with some very Eastern Baijiu and the Butterfly Punch, which is a traditional punch recipe which they've infused with some Jasmine tea.



# Old Bengal Bar – Jungle Book Terrace

Located in a Grade II listed building originally owned by the East India company, the Old Bengal bar has turned its outdoor terrace into a tropical paradise, complete with Jungle Book themed cocktails! Take advantage of their happy hour and enjoy two draught beers or two cocktails for just £7 every weekday until 7pm!



## Shoreditch Sky Terrace

Located next to Shoreditch Town Hall, on top of the Courthouse hotel, the Shoreditch Sky Terrace is the perfect place for a sunset cocktail or BBQ dinner with friends. With panoramic views overlooking the City of London skyline, relax after work with an Aperol Spritz or party the night away at the weekend when some of London's biggest DJs take control of the decks.



### Dinerama

A food and drink market from Street Feast, Dinerama is London's leading street food market. Featuring ten street food micro-diners; eight bars; three roof terraces; one raised mezzanine platform and a huge communal dining area, it's an open air sun trap in summer. When it gets cold, Dinerama is roofed and winter proof.

# Tell us about the cocktail you have chosen and why it is so great for the summer?

The Smoked Sunrise is great for summer as it is a unique cocktail perfect for summer city nights rather than a traditional summer cocktail for lounging on the beach. The yuzu gives the cocktail a clean and crisp finish, ideal for the London heat.

#### What's the secret to the perfect summer tipple?

# Redchurch Street then & now

A real rags to riches story, Redchurch Street has grown from humble beginnings into one of the most sought-after streets in East London for food, bars and shopping. Where there were once slums, now stand craft coffee spots, boutique retailers and fully-booked restaurants.



Redchurch Street was once one of the roads making up an area called the Old Nicol. This area was, by the 1880s, London's worst slum, with 120 cabinetmakers, 74 chairmakers and 24 woodcutters crammed into the tiny grid of streets, alongside 5,700 people who called it home. To get a vivid picture of the area, read Arthur Morrison's book "A Child of the Jago", the story of a poor boy growing up amid the violence, disease and squalor of the district. The plight of the poor led to the destruction of the slum in 1893 and the building of the Boundary Estate, the first planned social housing area in London, and arguably the world's first council estate. Most of the original buildings still remain, and Redchurch Street, once part of the slum, is today described as

'a design lover's dream come true'. It is only a fifth of a mile long, but you may find yourself spending much longer there than you might expect.

Redchurch Street has been transformed into a centre of design and fashion, an evolution that began in the 1990s when Sarah Lucas and Tracy Emin - who were represented by the nearby White Cube gallery - set up shop there. With adjacent Shoreditch House opening in 2009 during the area's wider gentrification, a steady stream of higher spending customers led to some of London's most interesting food and retail brands opening along Redchurch Street.

Shops

#### 1. APC

Since 1987 the French designer Jean Touitou has produced 'beautiful boring' clothes at relatively affordable prices. Both women's and men's fashion.

#### 2. Monologue

Full of contemporary goods and furniture for those drawn to Scandinavian-inspired décor.

#### 3. Aesop

This distinctive skin, hair and body-care company found its way to Redchurch Street in 2009 and has become something of an institution.

#### 4. Dragana Perisic

Stepping outside the fast cycle of the fashion industry, designing women's clothes and accessories that can be kept forever.

#### 5. Vinti Andrews

Two London-based designers, Vinti Tan and Paul Andrews bring contemporary women's fashion with a theme of rebellion and self-expression.

#### 6. Miista

The second shoe shop to arrive in the street. All the shoes are designed locally in Dalston and made in Spain.

#### 7. Kite

The world's first-ever 'eye bar', where you can arrange a personal appointment with your eyewear stylist, sitting in a booth to peruse the range of eyewear on offer whilst the beverage pioneers craft drinks for you. Who would have thought going to the optician could be such fun!



#### 8. Timothy Everest

A modern menswear brand that seamlessly fuses traditional bespoke tailoring with contemporary designs and fabrications

#### 9. Labour and Wait

Sells functional, timeless household hardware. It's like stepping back to a bygone era, with everything from balls of string to metal buckets and work clothes. I dare you to enter and not come away with at least one item.

#### 10. Tracey Neuls

A shoe shop with a difference, Tracey's collection is displayed suspended from the ceiling by ribbons or string. She started designing shoes over 15 years ago; each shoe is designed with two things in mind, function and fashion. If you want a unique shoe, shop here.

#### п. Lucky Fret Music Co

For something completely different try this guitar shop at the top end of the street. They sell new and used vintage guitars.

#### 12. Sunspel

Classic British clothing brand famed for its luxury basics for men and women, expertly crafted using the best materials.

#### 13. Radio

A high-end hair salon favoured by the fashion press, the Redchurch Street branch spreads over two floors, with large dual aspect windows, a rotating art selection and complimentary drinks on the weekend.

### Restaurants & bars

#### 1. Smoking Goat

Third restaurant from Ben Chapman, the menu mixes smoking and barbecuing techniques and draws inspiration from the late-night canteens and regional specialities of Thailand.

#### 2. Franze & Evans

Quickly becoming a favourite Shoreditch brunch spot, this corner restaurant also serves salads and marvellous cake throughout the day. Its neighbourhood feel has helped to make it so popular.

#### 3. Allpress Espresso Bar

For those that take their coffee very seriously, Allpress offers the best on Redchurch Street, with beans roasted daily.

#### 4. The Redchurch Bar

Don't be fooled by its dilapidated façade - this bright red bar makes a good pit-stop either at the beginning of a night out or for a night cap.

#### 5. Andina Shoreditch

Peruvian ceviche and street food can be found at this relaxed restaurant on the tip of Redchurch Street, along with smoothies and cocktails.

#### 6. Brat

Arguably London's hottest new restaurant, its simple menu combines Basque influences with the head chef's Welsh roots, and is named after its signature giant turbot main course.



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#### 7. The Boundary Project

Combining a high-end hotel and rooftop restaurant, the ground floor also features the Albion café, offering all day dining from a terrace extending up Boundary Street as well as a grocer and bakery.



#### 8. Barber and Parlour

Combining a men and women's grooming destination with a café and kitchen, its prime corner spot and bright pink stairwell makes it hard to miss.

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# Meet the neighbours

We chat to Cordelia Bunnis, who works in financial services a stone's throw from One Crown Place, to find out what it's like to work and play here.



How long have you worked in the area? It'll be four years in August. I started working here straight after University.

#### So many companies are moving here now. What do you think the area offers that other locations don't?

It's just got so much personality - there's always a lot going on, from live music in Broadgate Circle to the restaurants and bars of nearby Brick Lane. It feels like a young area to live, but also to work. There's a youthful energy flowing through it which gives it something special. What's so unique is the more liveable element alongside the working one; the best of both worlds really.

You mentioned the City. People associate the City with financial institutions, glass towers, suits and ties but, what does the real Square Mile mean to you?

There are lots of institutions here, but an increasing number of start ups are moving in too. Young companies are popping up and putting down roots - you're hearing more and more about WeWork for example - one is just around the corner.

From a lifestyle perspective the number of quality gyms is such a massive appeal. Psycle and 1Rebel are brilliant and so close. Whether it's on your way to work or after hours they're right on your doorstep. Afterwards, you've got loads of options for a drink or to grab a bite. We're so lucky to have all that here. It goes to show that the City is not just about working - the living and socialising side plays such a big part.





I've seen a huge amount of change. When I started there was always the standard 'EAT' and 'Pret', but there's now also pop ups like the ones round Finsbury Square. One week you're buying a slow-cooked pulled pork sandwich, next there's a vegan salad stall. It's a bit of a mini market kind of feel. Broadgate Circle didn't even exist when I first started here and it's brought a whole new social scene. Everyone goes down to the circle for a drink. Before you were more limited with places for this kind of thing, but now you have Prosecco trucks, pop up stalls and events.

How has it changed in the time you've been here?

We've got art installations too. These kinds of attractions appeal to the day trippers and weekend visitors. Whether you're here for a Saturday afternoon, or out on Brick Lane on a Thursday after work it's all there; it's like lots of different worlds collide here.

How do you think it will continue to change?

Crossrail is obviously a huge thing for the area - what impact do you think this will have?

It'll encourage more firms to move here for sure - it's such a big appeal. It also makes it more accessible for those who live further out. It's going to be a big thing for members of my team, making it easier and quicker for them to get to work. Also, at my company, people are travelling all the time, so quicker access to major stations and Heathrow will be such a bonus.

Shoreditch is known for its culture and creativity. Tell us about the last event or exhibition you've visited? I guess it wasn't technically Shoreditch, but for the London Design Festival last year Exchange Square had an inflatable sculpture installation which was really cool. The whole square was filled with colourful balloon structures and a bouncy castle which gave it a sort of carnival atmosphere.

#### Quickfire round:

#### Best place to grab a coffee:

It has to be Beany Green. It's really good for breakfast as well.

#### The 'go to' for a bite at lunch:

If you want unhealthy, Subcult has incredible sandwiches. If you want healthy... maybe Vital?... or any of the pop up food stalls in the circle.

There's also Whitecross Street market about a 10 min walk away. That's quite nice to wander round on a Thursday or Friday.

#### Favourite spot for a casual dinner:

Dinerama is the one for a casual bite. But, if you want something a bit fancier, Yauatcha is my favourite – it's Asian food with great dim sum. Pizza East is also just around the corner and then there's also Smoking Goat.

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

# A new work space


